Sacred Sounds Reborn Workshop for ECA. 12/5/24 4 Kislev 5785

What is Sacred Sounds Reborn? It is a nusach based project in collaboration with Beth Styles, a producer, composer and gifted musician.

Jewish music has been a lifelong passion of mine. Throughout the years in my role as Cantor, I have enjoyed seeking out new melodies that move me and elevate the intention of our prayers. I am recently retired, but beginning a more part time position in Delaware, and excited to share this music with them, and with congregations anywhere! I am thrilled to share it with the European Cantors Association here in Budapest.

Due to the time constraints, I am giving this to you for more information, so I. can get right to the music!

It is very emotional being here a second time- in 2022, I got covid towards the end of the ECA conference and ended up with a rare complication of a frozen/paralyzed vocal cord- it took almost two years, but it is moving and mostly healed. I am very lucky and thrilled to return to this wonderful conference of exceptional cantors from all over the world!

My grandfather interned at the Taback Temple/ Doheny Synagogue @1920-1921. He studied with the Chief Cantor of Budapest, Cantor Lazarus at the time. According to stories heard, my grandfather was offered the position of Chief Cantor (also perhaps earlier? his best friend Cantor Zavel Kwartin who also interned- story is not very clear...). I learned from my last trip here that in 1921, antisemitism was growing in Budapest and restrictions were put on Jews. My grandfather decided to leave and bring his family (wife and two daughters- my father was born in NYC 1927) to America. It is this decision that saved our family, and tragically he felt guilty leaving behind his two brothers also cantors, and three sisters – all with families. Over 70 members of our Katchko family perished during the Holocaust. It was this decision in Budapest, while studying and singing in the Doheny Synagogue that saved his life, and that of his immediate family.

My grandfather, Cantor Adolph Katchko (Aron Kaczka from Kalisz, Poland) was a pioneer in the world of nusach based synagogue music. His Thesaurus of Cantorial Liturgy was hailed as the first complete book of nusach for the modern cantor by Hebrew Union College in 1951. He reworked the elaborate motifs from his European background and composed every single phrase a cantor needed using the authentic prayer motifs- "nusach" that is still taught today in cantorial schools.

I wanted to use his music, fragments of it to keep the sounds in our ears, hearts and souls. The authentic nusach for Shabbat will be lost if we don't use it in our newer music as well. Many cantors use nusach for the occasional hatimah in America, for the ending or seal of the prayer. Why not use those beautiful motifs for an actual piece that uses English as well to help bring the meaning of the prayer into our lives? The lyrics can be translated into any language of course!

For years I dreamed of doing this project. I decided to try composing music while my voice was healing from covid. Creating these liturgical pieces based on the classic nusach of my grandfather is a dream come true! With the major help of my friend Beth Styles, we are creating new music for the synagogue that uses nusach authentically with interpretation of the prayer and singable refrains.

I have more to say about every prayer used in Sacred Sounds Reborn, but I'll save that for a future program, podcast, or interview! Each prayer has a story, a reason and a journey I hope to share with you at another time.

We just wrote a new Hallel Blessing and we are working on a V'neemar piece. I'm so excited to bring these nusach gems to life in a new musical and meaningful way. There are more in the works!

It is my hope and prayer that these new nusach based prayerful songs find their way into the cantorial world and creative musical worship settings.


